School Overview

History and Context

- **History** Walkerton Elementary School is located in Walkerton, Indiana. It is one of four schools within the John Glenn School Corporation. Our school serves kindergarten through sixth grade. Our sister elementary school, North Liberty Elementary, is located in North Liberty. Urey Middle School services grades seven and eight. John Glenn High School houses grades nine through twelve. The middle school and high school are both located in Walkerton. A unique feature of the John Glenn School Corporation is that boundary lines include townships from four counties: LaPorte, Marshall, St. Joseph, and Green. The counties are located in the northern third and western half of the state.
 - Walkerton, Indiana is a small community located in St. Joseph County. It is an incorporated town of 1.5 square miles. Major cities, such as Chicago and South Bend are within an hour to ninety minute drive. Manufacturing, agriculture, service industries, and some recreational facilities are the main employment opportunities for its residents.
- **Building Maintenance** Walkerton Elementary School was built in 1959 with major room additions and renovations done in 1976, 1988, and 2000. Other renovations down to the building were the following: Outside windows were replaced in the summer of 2021, an office remodel was done in the summer of 2021, LED lighting was installed in all of the hallway, classroom, cafeteria, and gymnasium in the summer of 2020 and 2021, and new carpet was installed in the hallways in the summer of 2022. Future plans beginning in 2023 include the replacement of the HVAC systems in each classroom, a bathroom remodel in the 4th and 5th grade hallway, and a new entryway at the front of the building.

Current Building Climate

• Staffing Statistics- The Walkerton Elementary School staff consists of 40 certified and 30 support staff serves our 594 students. The staff maintains four full-day kindergarten sections, four sections of first grade, four sections of second grade, four sections of third grade, and

three sections of fourth, fifth grade, and sixth grade. Our Head Start classroom and JESSE Preschool classroom are located at St. Patrick's Church in Walkerton; however, we share staff to help accommodate those students.

- **Specialized Staff-** Staff include a Principal, Guidance Counselor, High Ability Coordinator, Title One Director, teachers of music, band, art, physical education, special education teachers, interventionist, a speech pathologist, an EL aide, an occupational therapist, and a building tech facilitator. An instructional assistant has been trained to service students in the media center: This assistant is under the supervision of the high school media specialist.
 - A total of 14 part and full time aides assist students in the classrooms, resource rooms, and Minds in Motion program.
 Other staff members include the nurse, two secretaries, three custodians, and two full-time and four part-time cafeteria personnel.
- Socio-Economic and Special Needs Programming- Walkerton Elementary School is a working class community where many parents are employed in shift work industries as well as salary based socio-economic groups. Walkerton Elementary School goes beyond the school day to meet the needs of its students by providing a before and after school care program through the local Boys and Girls Club and by providing a breakfast program through the federal government.
 - Current enrollment at Walkerton Elementary School is 594 students for the 2023-2024 school year: Student population usually fluctuates between 580 to 600 students.
 - There are 148 students who are considered out of district transfers for the 2023-2024 school year, equating to roughly 24.9% of our student body.
 - There are 335 students who utilize the free and reduced lunch program for the 2023-2024 school year, equating to roughly 56% of our student body.
 - A bilingual aide assists students with their EL needs and for parental assistance and translations. Teachers have received some training regarding EL students. Every EL student who qualifies will receive an ILP with direct reference to their WIDA scores and goals.

Educational Programming

- <u>Curriculum</u>- Walkerton Elementary School is committed to providing an academic program that develops each child to his or her fullest potential. A strong teaching staff, standards based curriculum, Response to Intervention, High Ability programs, and remediation before, during, and after the school day provide students with academic skills and support needed for success. Additionally, the school district is committed to early intervention by providing full day kindergarten and a Pre-K program.
 - Walkerton Elementary School has adopted the Indiana Academic State Standards. We utilize the iReady curriculum which provides individualized curriculum to each student in both ELA and Math. Our curriculum includes a ninety minute reading block for Kindergarten through sixth grade classes.
 - In 2020, Walkerton Elementary School hired a licensed Interventionist to help remediate students, and employed a third special education teacher to lower the caseload numbers K-6.
 - RAZ Kids- Provides comprehensive leveled reading resources for students with hundreds of eBooks offered at 29 different levels of reading difficulty.
 - Xtra Math- online math fact fluency program that helps students develop quick recall and automaticity of their basic math facts
 - **Fundations** prevention program to help reduce reading and spelling failure.
- <u>Technology Integration</u>- Opportunities to integrate technology into the curriculum are encouraged and varied throughout grades K-5. Chromebooks are distributed for students in grades 3-6 and iPads for students K-2: Online state assessments and our iReady assessments are done in the classrooms. All classrooms have access to the internet for research and online resources. All classrooms Kindergarten through 6th Grade utilize ActivBoard technology. Document camera technology is used in each classroom to enhance instruction.
- Response to Intervention (RTI) In order to identify the needs of our students and to ensure their success, Response to Intervention (RTI) is used at Walkerton Elementary School from grades K-6. RTI integrates assessment and intervention within a multi-level prevention system to maximize student achievement and to reduce student academic issues in both ELA and Math. With RTI, Walkerton Elementary School is able to identify students at risk for poor learning outcomes, monitor student

progress, provide evidence-based interventions and adjust the intensity and nature of those interventions depending on a student's responsiveness, and identify students with learning disabilities or other disabilities.

- Each student at Walkerton Elementary School is monitored within the RTI process. In Tier I, all students receive direct whole group instruction in the general education classroom setting. The teacher assesses the skills of all students using assessments and observation. In Tier II, students receive three (3) days of 15-20 minute small group or individual instruction. In Tier III, students received five (5) days of 15-20 minute small group or individual instruction. RTI documentation is completed digitally via Google Drive. This allows the RTI Team to have immediate access to students' progress data at all times: This digital process is an effective way to share data and communicate across academic levels. When students move to a new grade, RTI information is shared with the upcoming teacher. This allows the individualized RTI process to be continued easily from one school year to the next.
- Remediation Services- Walkerton Elementary School is a school wide Title program. All students are eligible for services. All students K-3 benefit with additional class aides and small groups. Small group instruction is implemented throughout the day by instructional aides. After-school tutoring and study groups are available for remediating students who need time beyond the school day. Summer school instruction is also an option for students who need help beyond the school year.
- School Safety- Walkerton Elementary School creates a safe and secure environment for all staff and students. Fire drills are conducted each month as required by the state of Indiana: Additional drills conducted throughout the year are The Great Shake Out, monthly Lockdown Drills (Hard and Soft), twice daily exterior door checks, and reunification drills. Teachers inform the students about proper procedures and responses. A map of the school and an exit plan is posted in each classroom. The Crisis Plan outlines procedures for fire/storm drills and other safety issues. Copies of the Crisis Plan are located in the media center, the staff lounge, and the administrator's office.
 - Doors remain locked throughout each school day. To gain access to the building, visitors must communicate via a two-way intercom system. Once admitted, visitors report to the office and sign in.
 - There is a camera system that monitors both inside the building

- and the exterior of the building, including the playground, hallways, and front entrance.
- The corporation shares a resource officer to patrol the halls and assure building safety.
- Radio communication is maintained with all recess aides when outside.
- <u>Safe Learning Environment</u>- Walkerton Elementary School is committed to providing both students and staff with a safe and healthy school environment conducive to learning and teaching. Walkerton parents and students receive the Walkerton Elementary Student Handbook, which contains the School Board and building policies, rules, and procedures. This document can also be viewed digitally on our website. Policies, rules, and procedures are geared toward student safety.
 - Walkerton Elementary School has a Guidance Counselor whose duties include, but are not limited to:
 - Conflict management
 - Social and home issues
 - Safety issues
 - 504 Liaison
 - Monitor and enforce attendance policies
 - Red Ribbon Program
 - Drug Awareness
- <u>Student Achievement Assessments</u>- A variety of assessments are used to measure student achievement:
 - ILEARN- Third, fourth, and fifth grade students take the state ILEARN in the spring. This test assesses student achievement in the areas of Language Arts and Math. Additionally, the fourth and sixth grade students are tested in the area of Science, and the fifth grade students are tested in the area of Social Studies.
 - IREAD-3- Grade three reading assessment developed in accordance with state legislation. IREAD-3 is designed to measure foundational reading skills based on Indiana Academic Standards through grade three. In March 2023, 2nd Grade students were given the IREAD-3 assessment, with plans to continue this practice at Walkerton Elementary as long as it is made available through the IDOE.
 - **iReady** Teachers use iReady diagnostic and pre/post-test for both ELA and Math. Students are placed in flexible groups and may be moved according to needs. Students who are determined to have needs in the areas of special education or high abilities are placed in programs to meet these needs.

- <u>Parental Participation</u>- Teachers utilize phone conversations, email, Class Dojo, individualized meetings, and Parent Teacher Conferences in October. Parents are also given access to weekly update online reports of student scores, attendance, and disciplinary actions through Harmony.
 - Walkerton Elementary School benefits from parental involvement through an active Parent Teacher Association (PTA). Programs include but are not limited to a Book Fair, Fun Fair, Field Day, and a series of Family Fun Nights.

• Test Descriptions

- Kindergarten through Second Grade- Progress monitoring is used for all kindergarten, first and second grade students using biweekly assessments that correlate with the reading program. iReady Math and Reading Assessments are given three times each year, and Fundations is used for unit assessments. Incoming Kindergarten students are given a screener in the month of April to assess their readiness. Second Grade students will continue to be administered the IREAD-3 in March as long as it is made available through the IDOE.
- <u>Kindergarten through Sixth Grade</u>- The iReady Reading and Math assessment tests are given to kindergarten through sixth grade students. Third, fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students take the ILEARN test. The IREAD-3 assessment is administered to all students in grade three. Kindergarten through sixth grade also do the textbook comprehensive reading and math tests.
- Additional Testing- Students that are experiencing difficulty are referred for further evaluation and testing through the Title One program and the interventionist. Students are referred to the RTI Team for further testing to determine target areas for remediation. Instruments used are the Dibels, CORE, GMADE, Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test, and Woodcock Reading Test. The CogAT (Cognitive Abilities Test) is used to determine eligibility in grades K, 2, & 5. Dyslexia Information (KG-2) all students are screened and the number of at-risk students is posted on school website. The IDOE approved Dyslexia screeners utilized are iReady, the Arkansas Rapid Screener, and/or Words Their Way.
