Application Fee Waivers

Typically, fee waivers are available to students for whom the college application fees would create a financial burden. Students who are eligible for fee waivers to college entrance exams, like the SAT or ACT, are usually also eligible for application fee waivers. Some Indiana colleges offer free applications to all students. Visit LearnMoreIndiana.org/college/applying-to-schools/#fee-header to find out what application fees are at each of Indiana's colleges public and private (non-profit) colleges. Not all colleges accept fee waivers. Of those that do, the most common are:

- **ACT fee waiver** (If you are eligible for a fee waiver for the ACT your school counselor can fill out a form to obtain one for you.)
- **College Board fee waiver** (If you are eligible for a fee waiver for the SAT, your counselor can fill out a form to obtain one for you.)
- National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) fee waiver (If your counselor agrees that you meet one of the requirements such as: family income, receiving public assistance, being an orphan or ward of the state, or meeting other criteria, you or your counselor can learn more at <u>nacacnet.org/studentinfo/feewaiver/pages/default.aspx</u>.)
- 21st Century Scholar fee waiver (if you are a 21st Century Scholar, almost all public colleges accept this fee waiver and some private colleges do as well. View a list of 21st Century Scholar incentives at <u>Scholars.IN.gov/students/high-school-#12th-grade</u>—see Scholar Support and Incentives.)
- Veterans fee waiver (Ask your school counselor for a fee waiver if you are the child of veteran(s).)
- **Campus visits fee waiver** (Some colleges offer fee waivers if you have visited their campus prior to applying. Contact the college's admissions office to find out more.)
